"A Passion for China"

On Monday, May 13, at the First Congregational Church of Greenwich in Old Greenwich, Artist Molly Hatch will talk through the evolution of her work—both as a tableware designer and as a ceramic artist—and discuss her exploration of the history of how porcelain came from the East to the West in her book, *A Passion for China*. The Globe and Mail of Canada said the following concerning Molly Hatch's new book: "Artist and ceramicist Molly Hatch makes whimsical, charming, yet undeniably special pottery... In her new, beautifully illustrated book, *A Passion for China: A Little Book About the Objects We Eat From, Live with and Love*, she explores the roots of her own fascination with fine ceramics as well as the more immediate enjoyment that well-used porcelain can present."

In the past decade the name Molly Hatch has become synonymous with contemporary ceramics. Hatch's ceramic installations, inspired by historical decoration, have been exhibited and collected all over the world and garnered her a loyal and fervent following. The Todd Merrill Studio in New York City has represented Hatch since 2013.

In 2013, Hatch had a solo museum exhibition at the Philadelphia Art Alliance and was included in "New Blue and White," a contemporary decorative arts exhibition at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. In 2014, *Physic Garden*, a monumental 456-plate work, was installed at the High Museum of Art in Atlanta, as well as *Caughley Landscape*, another installation commissioned by the museum and the Woodruff Arts Center in Atlanta. In 2016, the Clayarch Gimhae Museum in Gimhae, South Korea exhibited a selection of wall installations by Hatch. Chronicle Books published Hatch's first illustrated book of paintings in March 2015, and September Publishing printed Hatch's second major book of paintings and historic research, *A Passion for China*, in October 2017. Hatch installed her largest museum commission to date at the Newark Museum in Newark, New Jersey in 2017. Commissioned by then Chief Curator Ulysses G. Dietz, Hatch designed and executed a triptych of almost 600 plates for a permanent wall installation titled *Repertoire*.

The lecture will take place at 1:15 p.m. on May 13 at the First Congregational Church of Greenwich at 108 Sound Beach Avenue in Old Greenwich, Connecticut 06870. Tea will follow the lecture, and guests are welcome. For information, go to ctcsc.org or call 203.912.7226.

On Sunday, May 12 from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., the Clay art Center (CAC) in Port Chester, New York, will offer participants the unique opportunity to learn from ceramics artist Molly Hatch about surface decoration techniques. In this one-day workshop, ways to approach surface decoration and its relationship to form in ceramic object making will be explored. This will begin by walking through surface design concepts and discussion around inspiration and ways to find the artist's muse--from the museum to the internet. Observe how to source and translate 2-D patterns and images into both surface decoration and form. In addition to hard-slab construction, this workshop will demonstrate a wide range of surface techniques Molly uses on both her design work and her one-of-a-kind artwork.
